

Vernon and I apply for the grant, plan for road signs, and an educational system of informational signs at beaches, flyers and a web site.








July 2017 - Contacted Annette Matsuda at DOT Maui Office of the sign project idea.

DOT requirements for our signs are to follow the "brown" Historical/Point of Interest signs






## Moku (District)






















River Signs: river signs are placed on both sides of the highway
